Find an unusual place to read a book and take a photo of you reading there to share on Flipgrid. Some of you have already done this some photos we have seen include reading; to chickens, or other pets, at the beach, in a paddling pool and many more.</p>	<p>Research your favourite author. You could find out how many books they have written, how old they were when they first started writing books, what they liked to do at school, if they had any other jobs before becoming an author.</p>
<p>Use any media to make a book cover for your favourite book. You might want to draw it, paint it, make a 3D model of it, anything you can think of! Perhaps you can write the recipe, or explain why it is the perfect reading snack. Maybe you can even make the snack and try it out while reading a book.</p>
