Impact of PPG spending 2015/16

Following impact statements are based on the school's analysis to date. They will be compared with national figures when these become available later in the year.

For attainment of disadvantaged pupils across the whole school (Correct when Raise is out)

% achieving ARE/+ increased in reading, writing and maths. The gap between school disadvantaged pupils and national non-disadvantaged pupils narrowed by 3% in reading and 14% in writing. The gap widened by 4% in maths. At the end of July 2016 the gaps were 19% in reading, 26% in writing and 12% in maths

For attainment of disadvantaged pupils end of KS2:

- In 2016 100% met the expected standard in reading, writing and maths
- In 2016 100% met the expected standard in grammar, punctuation and spelling
- · We await publication of data regarding narrowing the gap

For progress of disadvantaged pupils end of KS2:

For attainment of disadvantaged pupils end of KS1:

- In 2016 100% met the expected standard in reading and maths and 75% in writing
- We await publication of data regarding narrowing the gap

For Year 1 phonics screening and Year 2 retake:

No disadvantaged pupils were required to retake the phonics screening test

Summary of PP spending for 2015/16 academic year

Objectives in spending Pupil Premium Grant:

To raise attainment in all children with a particular focus on disadvantaged pupils who are

- on free school meals
- children in care
- children who have a parent or parents serving in the armed forces

with a focus on those who are not reaching age related expectations in maths and English and/or making expected progress from their starting points. This will be achieved by providing quality first teaching, using appropriate interventions, and one to one or group support working with additional specialist staff. The grant will also be used to provide tailored interventions for children who need emotional support to enable them to enable them to maximise their potential and lead healthy active lives.

Summary of spending and actions taken for 2015/16 academic year:

£25796 To fund Pupil Premium champions. This is a team consisting of one part time teacher and one part time teaching assistant delivering targeted and precise short, sharp interventions at risk of not achieving age related expectation and/or making expected progress from starting points.

£1000 Residential trips and day trips support

£500: Funding after school club to offer respite to parents/families, where this will have a positive effect on wellbeing of pupils and impact positively on learning outcomes.

£5000: To continue to part fund individual and group support to children in literacy and maths across the school and provide additional support in priority years (eg: Year 2 to narrow the attainment gap at end of KS1; Year 3 to support those who failed their Year 1 phonics screening and those underperforming in reading, writing and maths responsible for attainment gap in 2014)

£1414 (£37.23 x 38): School based librarian has dedicated time to support all pupils eligible for pupil premium and their families to read widely and often.

£5,800: To part fund Learning Mentor support which offers vital support for children's emotional wellbeing. At present over 50% of pupils eligible for pupil premium are accessing this service and this constitutes over 50% of the learning mentor's hours.

£1000: Training of staff to improve provision for those in receipt of pupil premium (eg headteacher attending Pupil Premium Conference, maths training from Babcock Advisors for Teaching Assistants delivering 1:1 and group learning for pupils in receipt of pupil premium)

Planned PP spending and actions for 2016/17 academic year

c£25,000: To fund Pupil Premium Champion initiative. Salaries, training and resources.

c£1000 Residential trips and day trips support

c£500: Funding after school club and extra-curricular clubs to offer respite to parents/families and improve pupils' self-esteem and confidence.

c£5000: To continue to part fund individual and group support to children in literacy and maths across the school and provide additional support in priority years (awaiting publication of national averages to inform narrowing the gap actions)

c£1000: School based librarian providing dedicated time for pupil premium children.

c £6,000: To part fund Learning Mentor support which offers vital support for children's emotional wellbeing.

c£500: Training of staff to improve provision for those in receipt of pupil premium
